What is Intersectionality?

Intersectionality is a sociological theory about how an individual can face multiple threats of discrimination when their identities overlap a number of minority classes, such as race, gender, age, ethnicity, disability, and other characteristics

The term was coined by legal scholar Kimberlé Crenshaw

What Are Microaggressions?

A microaggression is a statement, action, or incident regarded as an instance of indirect, subtle, or unintentional discrimination against members of a marginalized group such as a racial or ethnic minority

What is Over-whiteness?

The over-whiteness is seen everywhere, particularly in our advocacy spaces where White disabled voices are prominent in discussing topics of interests and fighting against inequalities, and within leadership roles of prominent and grassroot disability-centered organizations

What is Oppression?

Oppression is the systematic mistreatment, exploitation, and lowering in status of a group (or groups) of people by another group (or groups)

It occurs when a group holds power over others in society by maintaining control over social institutions, and society's laws, rules, and norms

What Is Privilege?

"Privilege exists when one group has something of value that is denied to others simply because of the groups they belong to, rather than because of anything they've done or failed to do.

Access to privilege doesn't determine one's outcomes, but it is definitely an asset that makes it more likely that whatever talent, ability, and aspirations a person with privilege has will result in something positive for them."

How Disability Spaces Are Problematic

What does it mean to be a disabled PoC in disability spaces?

- Lack of visibility & diversity of the disabled experience
- Poor understanding of how intersections impact quality of life and ability to access resources and supports
- Harder time to build community/village among members that look like you/share similar life experiences

The School-to-Prison Pipeline

The "school-to-prison pipeline" refers to the policies and practices that push our nation's schoolchildren, especially students of color in low/no income areas, out of classrooms and into the juvenile and criminal "justice" systems

The racial disparities are even starker for students with disabilities

Disability Justice & Juvenile "Justice"

- Black Disabled students are 16x more likely to have police called on them. (NBC, 2017
- Of the 85% of children in detention eligible for special education services, only 37% received services at their schools. (SPLC, 2007)

- 65% of boys & 75% of girls in juvenile detention have a mental illness. (NIMH, 2002)
- Black children represent 18% of preschool enrollment, but 48% of preschool children receiving more than one out-of-school suspension. (DoEDCR, 2014)
- Up to 85% of children in juvenile detention have at least one disability. (SPLC, 2007)

Normalization of Violence

- In 2013-2014, 1.6 million students attended public school with police and no counselors
- Students with disabilities are 23 times more likely to be mechanically restrained
- Black students with disabilities arrested at a higher rater than any other student group data has been collected on
- Black teens with disabilities are 16 times more likely to be arrested at school than white students without disabilities
- Only 11 states have outright prohibitions on carrying handguns on campus
